Asu Aksoy is presently in charge of international projects at Santral Istanbul, a new international arts and culture initiative by the Bilgi University, Istanbul. She is also a member of the Artistic Committee of Istanbul 2010 European Capital of Culture, and a visiting fellow at University of London Goldsmiths College. Dr. Aksoy worked for many years in British universities on research projects focusing on urban and cultural transformation in the context of migrations, globalization, and technological change.

Sevil Alkan studied architecture at Middle East Technical University. She received her master's degree in European Urban Studies at Bauhaus University, Weimar, Germany. Currently, she continues her Ph.D. research there and works in urban and architectural design projects in Istanbul as an architect.
