Abraham Asnake, born in 1987, is a lecturer and research fellow in the Department of Anthropology at Hawassa University, Hawassa, Ethiopia. He has conducted research on the indigenous early-warning practices of the agro-pastoral communities in southwest Ethiopia, and social unrest and the competing institutions of peace-making in the multi-cultural city of Hawassa. His research interests pivot around social networks and capital, ethnic federalism, inter-ethnic relations, state–society relations, traditional governance and conflict resolution mechanisms, traditional natural resource management, and linking technology with local innovations.

Alula Pankhurst (PhD), born in 1962, is the Ethiopia Country Director for the Young Lives longitudinal research project run by the University of Oxford. He obtained his PhD in Social Anthropology from the University of Manchester and taught at Addis Ababa University for 16 years. His research interests include migration and displacement, poverty and wellbeing, childhood and adolescence, minorities and social exclusion, customary institutions and dispute resolution, and the longer-term impact of development interventions.

Dagne Shibru Abate (PhD), born in 1975, is a social anthropologist at Hawassa University, Ethiopia. Dagne received his MA in Social Anthropology and BA in Sociology from Addis Ababa University, Ethiopia, and obtained his PhD in Anthropology (with a specialization in conflict and peace studies) at Andhra University, India, in 2014. Dagne served as head of Academic Program and Quality Assurance (2014–2017) and dean of College of Social Sciences and Humanities (2018–2022) at Hawassa University. Dagne is an active member and chairperson of the Ethiopian Society of Sociologists, Social Workers and Anthropologists, ESSSWA, South chapter. Dagne's research interests include conflict resolution and peace, federalism and ethnic relations, poverty and wellbeing, social institutions and development, and agriculture and pastoralism.

Hanna Getachew Amare (PhD), born 1979, is a social anthropologist in the Department of Anthropology at Hawassa University, Ethiopia. She received a PhD in Anthropology and Linguistic-Historical Studies from the University of Messina, Italy in 2014. From 2001–2007 Hanna worked as a curator and assistance researcher at the South Omo Research Center (SORC), Jinka. Since 2009, she has been engaging in curricular and extracurricular activities such as, teaching, research, and leadership at Hawassa University, Jinka University, Arbaminch University, and Wachemo University. Her research focuses on indigenous knowledge systems, museum and public education, Ethiopia–India relations, tourism and globalization, PhD trajectory & supervision in Ethiopia, women in conflict, and religion and development.

Kelemework Tafere Reda (PhD), born in 1971, is a postdoctoral researcher at the Frobenius Institute for Research in Cultural Anthropology in Frankfurt am Main, Germany. Reda has been working as an associate professor of Anthropology at Mekelle University, Ethiopia until he joined the Frobenius institute as a Gerda Henkel fellow in February 2022. He is also currently working on research projects based in Denmark and France. Between 2014 and 2016 he was a visiting scholar at the University of South Africa (UNISA), Pretoria, South Africa. His research focuses on migration, informal institutions, conflict resolution, and gender relations in apparel industries.

Kim Glück (PhD), born in 1986, is a social anthropologist specialising in Ethiopian studies. After studying social anthropology and history in Frankfurt am Main, Germany, and in Montpellier, France, she completed her doctorate in Mainz, Germany. For her doctoral thesis, she worked for several months with a professional dance group from Addis Ababa, studying dances and dance performances. She conducts research in Ethiopia as well as in the Ethiopian diaspora in the USA and Israel. Her research interests include migration and diaspora studies, performance studies and anthropology of the future.

Sabine Klocke-Daffa (PhD), born in 1956, is Professor of Social and Cultural Anthropology at Tuebingen University, Germany. She is member of the Collaborative Research Center on ResourceCultures (SFB 1070 RessourcenKulturen) at UT, funded by the German Research Foundation. Klocke-Daffa has done intensive fieldwork in Southern Africa, mostly Namibia, but has also worked in Madagascar and in Iran. Her research focuses on exchange relations, basic income grants, social insurances, the cultural dynamics of resources, migration, and children. In addition, she is engaged in applied anthropology, mainly science communication and anthropology in schools.

He was adjunct professor at the Darmstadt University of Applied Sciences for 5 years. His current research focus is on the challenges and opportunities of the Eritrean communities in Germany.

Sophia Thubauville (PhD), born in 1979, is a social anthropologist at the Frobenius Institute for Research in Cultural Anthropology in Frankfurt am Main, Germany. In 2022, he was a visiting scholar at the Frobenius Institute for Research in Cultural Anthropology in Frankfurt am Main, Germany. Nida's research focuses on entrepreneurship, migration, identity, social change, African diaspora, ethnicity, and nation-making.
