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Anatoly Boyashov is a post-doctoral researcher at the Research Training Group “World Politics” at Bielefeld University, Germany. Anatoly received his Ph.D. from Bielefeld University in 2020 (*magna cum laude*). Before research at Bielefeld University, Anatoly worked at the Center for Sociological and Internet Research in Saint Petersburg where he developed tools for the social network analysis of international organizations. Anatoly’s publications cover thematic areas related to human rights, international organizations, the EU integration, and the Eurasian integration processes.
