**Lenn Blaschke** is a media artist and research associate at the Institute for Democratic Culture at Magdeburg-Stendal University of Applied Sciences. His work investigates how simultaneity and instantaneity across digital and physical worlds challenge contemporary norms and values. Using VR and installations, he explores extended realities as spaces of political and cultural reflection.
