Flourishing Assets: Indexers Today

28th Annual Meeting of ASI

The American Society of Indexers is holding its annual meeting from May 16-18, 1996 at Denver, Colorado, Executive Tower Inn. The meeting starts with four workshops for professional development: (1) *Indexing for Beginners*, to be held by A. Hall from Moffat, Scotland, (2) *Weaving your own Small Web: I did it, so can you!*, to be held by the developers of the ASI Web Page, K.J. Bero and J.C. Wright, both from Seattle, WA. (3) *Marketing your Indexing Services*, to be held by A. Leach, Bermuda Dunes, CA, Editor of Key Words, and (4) *The Structure of Book Indexes*, to be held by B.H. Weinberg, Jamaica, NY.

The second day will be devoted to Roundtable discussions for 12 participants at each table on the following 6 Subjects: Medical, Indexing, Legal Indexing, Scholarly Indexing, Cookbook Indexing, Indexing Biographies, Computer Manual Indexing; and on the following 6 General Topics: Getting Started; Finding Work; Managing Your Time; Networking Feast or Famine – How to Survive; AOL-INDEX-L-Internet – What are They?; Mentor/Trainee/Assistant Relationships.

The third day starts with the keynote address to be given by Linda MILLEMANN (Denver) on: *The Tattered Cover: A*

journey of service and selection. Two panels follow and open the discussions. The first is devoted to “*Specialty Indexing*” with panelists B.M. Holsclaw, E.C. Porpa, Ch. Strickland and the second to “*Medical Indexing*” with panelists D. Balopole, A. Holt, M. Coughlin, and I.C. Tullar. Thereafter the following papers will be presented: L. LATHROP (Idaho Springs, CO): Creating great indexes for technical documentation. – T. HODOBA, S. MOODY (Minnesota): Skills Transfer: Raiding the pantry. – L. MONCRIEF (Tustin, CA): ASI's new frontier: the world Wide Web. – I. WILLIAMS (Fairport, NY): How to make your work station more comfortable.

Call for Participation

7th ASIS SIG/CR Classification Research Workshop: An Interdisciplinary Meeting

The American Society for Information Science Special Interest Group on Classification Research (ASIS SIG/CR) invites submissions for the 7th ASIS Classification Research Workshop, to be held at the 59th Annual Meeting of ASIS in Baltimore, MD. The workshop will take place Sunday, Oct. 20, 1996, 8:30 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. ASIS '96 continues through Thursday, Oct. 24th.

The Classification Research Workshop is designed to promote the exchange of ideas among active researchers with interests in classification creation, development, management, representation, display, comparison, compatibility, theory, and application. Emphasis will be on semantic classification, in contrast to statistically based schemes. Topics include, but are not limited to:

Applications such as subject analysis, natural language understanding, information retrieval, expert systems. – Automated techniques to assist in creating classification schemes. – Bases for semantic classes. – Classification algorithms. – Comparison and compatibility between classification schemes. – Concept acquisition. – Data structures and programming languages for classification schemes. – Image classification. – Inheritance and subsumption. – Interfaces for displaying classification schemes. – Knowledge representation schemes. – Procedural knowledge in classification schemes. – Reasoning with classification schemes. – Relations and their properties. – Representation and access on the Internet. – Software for management of classification schemes. – Statistical techniques used for developing explicit semantic classes. – User-based classification strategies. – Warrant for concepts in classification schemes.

The Classification Research Workshop welcomes submissions from various disciplines. Those interested in participating are invited to submit (1) a short (1-2 page single-spaced) position paper summarizing substantive work that has been conducted in the above areas or other related areas, (2) a statement briefly outlining the reason for wanting to participate in the workshop, and (3) a brief (1 page) personal statement describing research interests.

Submissions may include background papers as attachments.

Submitted position papers will be refereed for acceptance. The authors of accepted position papers will be asked to submit an expanded version. Some of the authors of expanded papers will be invited to speak to their papers in brief presentations during the workshop. All expanded papers will be published in the preliminary proceedings by Information Today, Inc.

Early registration fees for all participants are \$35.00 for SIG/CR members and/or participants with expanded papers; \$45.00 for ASIS members; \$60.00 for non-members. (As the workshop is separate from the ASIS Annual Meeting, an additional registration is required for the Annual Meeting). Electronic Access to Fiction:

Research and Development in Subject Searching, Indexing, and Knowledge Transfer via OPACs and Networking

A Call for Papers for the Research Seminar, 11-13 Nov. 1996, Copenhagen, Royal School of Librarianship, has been distributed. It will be arranged by the Scandinavian Book House Consortium and the Royal School of Librarianship and is sponsored by the NORDBOK/Nordfolk, the Nordic Council of Ministers.

New ways of accessing fiction and other works of art are required with the introduction of networking and new electronic media in libraries. The aim of the seminar is thus both, to strengthen the Nordic cultural collaboration in access to fiction and, at the same time, to contribute to international research and development in electronic access to fiction and other works of art.

Papers are invited in 6 major areas as follows:

Access to fiction via networks, such as the Internet/World Wide Web – IT applications in the arts and humanities, including cataloguing and electronic mediation of works of art, for instance images and music – Classification and indexing of fiction or other works of art in local online library catalogues and national/regional online catalogues – Electronic information services for specific user groups and communities, for instance for children; examples: OPAC design, enriched catalogs, multimedia applications – Knowledge organization for specific user groups and communities,

including, for instance, reader-interest categorization of collections, stock categorization, compilation of user-oriented vocabularies (classification schemes, lists of subject headings, thesauri) – Multilingual information searching and compilation of multilingual, multicultural thesauri, in particular for the arts and humanities.

Prospective speakers are asked to submit extended abstracts in English (500-1000 words) to the chair of the seminar as indicated below, until July 1, 1996. An international program committee will review the abstracts. Authors of accepted abstracts will be requested to submit full papers for publication in seminar proceedings.

302nd Meeting, British Classification Research Group

The meeting was held on Friday, Nov. 3, 1995 at University College London with eight members present. The Minutes include a short resumé of the meeting No. 301, held on April 28 at UCL and which took the form of a demonstration of the facilities and resources of the Internet, led by Mr. C. NEILSON. Particular interest was focussed on the organization of information on the Internet and the use of classification in providing structured indexes to its resources. No minutes were recorded. The meeting scheduled for July 14 was cancelled because of a threatened rail strike on that day. At the 302nd meeting Mr. MILLS tabled and introduced a draft schedule for physics of BC2, the new Bliss Classification. This schedule had previously been discussed in Oct. 1994. The presentation showed how this part has been organized into four major facets, following the structure of the BSO: *Operations and agents*, *Processes and properties*, *Substantive matter*, and *Bulk matter*. The Group discussed the problematic areas. Results of the discussions will be considered in the final version of the scheme.
