These individuals have dedicated years of their lives to giving first-hand testimonies of historical events. In speaking about their ordeals, their survival and how they embarked upon new lives, they have moved countless people and encouraged them to reflect.

For real? places this legacy in a worthy setting and helps anchor accounts of National Socialist crimes in our cultural memory. It forms a new type of archive that preserves stories, experiences and voices – for all of us, now and on into the future.
