EKATERINA GLADKOVA

is a researcher and doctoral candidate at the Karlsruhe Institute of Technology (KIT) in Germany. She holds a bachelor's degree in architecture and a master's degree in urban planning, and her studies included periods of study and research at KIT. Ekaterina is a practicing urban planner. Ia is involved in several research projects, including "How Architecture Is Used as a Tool for Social Stratification in Soviet Tbilisi" and "The Future of Modernist Housing." Ia holds a PhD from Georgian Technical University (GTU) and was a Fulbright Research Scholar at Cornell University. She was also a visiting researcher at the Architecture Faculty, RWTH University of Aachen.

NANO (NANA) ZAZANASHVILI

holds a master's degree in architecture and is a researcher in urban planning and architecture. Her research interests include urban transformation processes, Soviet urban planning and architecture, cultural heritage preservation, and urban and housing policy. During this period, she worked as a researcher, local expert, and project coordinator/manager.
