Valérie Aubourg is Professor of Anthropology and Ethnology at Lyon Catholic University, where she heads the 'Confluence: Sciences et Humanités' research unit. From 2005 to 2011, she conducted research on Charismatic-Pentecostal movements in Réunion Island, published under the title *Christianismes charismatiques à La Réunion* (Karthala 2014). Her work then focused on the evangelical influence within French Catholicism. This resulted in her study *Réveil catholique* (Labor et Fides 2020).

His doctoral research investigated the process of institutionalization of the Emmanuel Community in French-speaking Europe. Her areas of specialization are Catholicism in Germany, religion during the Covid-19 pandemic, and qualitative research methods.

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Katherine Kelaidis is Director of Research and Content at the National Hellenic Museum in Chicago and a Research Associate of the Centre for Orthodox Christian Studies, Cambridge. She studied Classical Languages at the University of California, Berkeley and the University of London.

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
