Russian Regional ISKO Conference 1993

Our first Regional Conference in Moscow, May 10-14, 1993 is taking shape. As of Jan. 1993 some 40 colleagues have expressed their interest in participation, however, so far only 7 from abroad. *Knowledge Organization - Problems and Trends* is the overall theme. Conference languages are Russian and English. The abstracts will be available in Russian and English before the conference; proceedings volumes will be published after the event. Among the chairmen of the sessions are Profs. V.V.Nalimov, Moskva and A.I.Sokolov, St.Petersburg. The registration fee for foreign participants is US\$ 150.-. Accommodation is offered by Moscow librarians in their apartments for US\$ 30.- per night (hotel rooms cost US\$180.-!). System-oriented, Cognitive and Model-Related Aspects of Knowledge Organization

This is the topic of the 3rd Conference of the German ISKO Chapter to take place in Weilburg, Germany, Oct.26-29, 1993. The Call for Papers has already been announced in the previous issue of this journal but will be repeated shortly with the 7 general topics to be treated: *Epistemology and Knowledge Organization - Neural Networks as Systems of Knowledge Organization - Knowledge Acquisition and Knowledge Representation - Practice and Systems of Knowledge Organization - KO in Libraries - KO and its Teaching - KO in Special Application Areas*.

In the Call brochure each topic is described by 5-8 subtopics. Abstracts of proposed papers should be sent by March 31, 1993 to the second address below. Spanish Conference on Knowledge Organization

On November 18-20, 1992, the "I Jornadas sobre Organización del Conocimiento", a meeting on Knowledge Organization and Scientific Information was held at the University of Zaragoza, Spain. The aim was to exchange ideas on the way in which knowledge is represented, organized and transferred from different disciplinary perspectives, in order to enlighten the problem of scientific information. Scholars from Cognitive Psychology, Information Science, Computer Science, Philosophy and

Biological Engineering discussed the *problems of knowledge*. The conference was opened by keynote paper of a prominent Spanish information scientist, Emilia CURRAS, who spoke on the problems of knowledge organization in the present world and its connections with the world of information science. Thereafter, the philosopher Ignacio IZUZQUIZA spoke on "Information as an illness", considering the problems that the exponential growth of information is posing on social scientists. The bio-engineer Petero MARIJUAN presented a summary of the recent research on cellular information processes, and considered their implications for social information scientists and actual organization of science. The cognitive psychologist Juan Antonio BERNARD considered the "Contributions of Cognitive Psychology to the Analysis and Representation of Knowledge". The mathematician and computer engineer Petro M. AGUADO presented a general scope of the evolution of human-machine interfaces towards intelligent user-oriented retrieval aids. Fco.Javier GARCIA MARCO considered the need of working on a comprehensive model of knowledge acquisition and transfer processes for improved informational and scientific transfer practice. Bonifacio MARTIN, a physicist, and Carlos SERRANO, economist, presented their work on "Connectionist Systems for Financial Decision-Making". Migual Engal ESTEBAN spoke on the "Epistemological Bases of the Documentary Classification Systems of Scientific Knowledge". Fernando GALINDO, a teacher of law and Pilar LASALA presented their work on expert systems for law-related information retrieval. Finally, Antonio GARCIA ended the panel with a conference on the "Need for an Interdisciplinary Adjustment in Documentary Research".

The discussions took into consideration the *Art and Architecture Thesaurus* as well as also the *Oxford Companion to the Decorative Arts*.

Electronic Imaging at ASIS Midyear Meeting 1993

This year's Midyear Meeting of the American Society for Information Science (ASIS) will take place from May 23-27, 1993 at Knoxville, Tennessee. A 20-pages bulletin as of Jan.17, 1993 has been released with the preliminary program on the very many events planned. Its introductory section, headed *Electronic Imaging: Clip Art to Virtual Reality* reads as follows:

"This important conference will address current issues in imaging for information management. When do you need full text versus the image of the text? How well does database software handle mixed images and text? Has automated indexing of images been explored and perfected? To what extent and when does the image need to be entirely accurate?

As networks become increasingly a necessity rather than a luxury, integrating imaging with national and international networks takes on added urgency, including development of compatible standards and adequate bandwidth capacity. Imaging's potential as an alternative to film- or paper-based image utilization and management requires a basic understanding of vision and how the brain and eye work together to analyze information.

The ASIS 1993 Mid-Year meeting will explore all this and more, with over 30 technical sessions and plenary sessions featuring John GAGE of Sun Microsystems, Donna COX of the National Center for Supercomputer Applications, and Daniel MASYS of the National Library of Medicine. Combined with excellent pre- and post-meeting seminars, this meeting offers a comprehensive introduction and exploration of imaging and imaging systems for information management.

Yukio Nakamura Received FID Award

Our Japanese coordinator and member of ISKO's Scientific Advisory Council, Prof. Yukio NAKAMURA, Tokyo, was given the first *FID Distinguished Information Professional Award* in recognition of his outstanding contribution to the information profession. The award is given biennially during the FID Conference and Congress. We wish to congratulate our dear colleague on this fine recognition of his professional work in Japan and his international cooperation.

Born on 1 Jan. 1917, Yukio Nakamura graduated in Physics from the University of Tokyo in 1940. He was involved in R&D electronics for 20 years in the Nippon Telegraph and Telephone Public Corporation. During this period he noticed the usefulness of the UDC and became one of the founding members of the UDC Society of Japan (1950).

Prof. Nakamura was also a member of the FID Central Classification Committee until it was dissolved in 1986. Since 1991, he has been the representative of INFOSTA and has attended six preparatory meetings of the UDC Consortium. After 1992 he was nominated by INFOSTA as a member of the Executive Committee of the UDC.
