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### **Armando Dal Fabbro**

is an architect and Professor of Architectural and Urban Composition at IUAV University of Venice, where he is the coordinator of the PhD program in Architectural Composition. In 2019, she published a book on corners in Palladio's architecture.

In 2011, he completed his doctorate on illusionist wall paintings in Venetian villas of the 16th century.
